W5KUB to Stream Hamvention® 2018 Worldwide

"Amateur Radio Roundtable" Host Tom Medlin, W5KUB, will once again livestream selected activities from the 2018 Hamvention® in Xenia, Ohio, during what he calls the "Hamvention Marathon Webcast" — more than 40 hours of live video from the annual show. This will mark Medlin's 17th year covering the show for those unable to attend Hamvention.

GR9RW will be the Royal Wedding Special Event Call Sign

To celebrate the marriage of Great Britain's Prince Harry to American actress Meghan Markle, special event call sign GR9RW will be on the air May 19 - 23. It's believed that this will mark the first use of a GR9 call sign prefix in the UK.

The Royal Wedding will take place on May 19 at St. George's Chapel in England's Windsor Castle. Members of the Cray Valley Radio Society (CVRS) will operate from their club station in Eltham. GR9RW will primarily use SSB and CW, with the addition of FM on VHF and UHF. Two HF stations and one VHF station will cover all bands from 80 meters to 70 centimeters. The Club's well-equipped station will be augmented with additional antennas allowing simultaneous operation from all three stations.

Logs will be uploaded daily to Clublog and a colour QSL card will be available on request, either via our regular QSL manager Owen, G4DFI or via OQRS.

Former "Coast to Coast AM" Radio Show Host Art Bell, W60BB, SK

Former "Coast to Coast AM" and "Dreamland" radio host Art Bell, W6OBB, of Pahrump, Nevada, died on Friday, April 13, at his home, the Nye County Sheriff's Office announced. He was 72. A KSNV news report indicated that Bell's family was with him when he died. The Sheriff's Office said an autopsy would be performed.

"The cause of Bell's death was yet to be revealed," is how International Business Times put it in its obituary of Bell, lending an air of mystery to its account, much as Bell himself enjoyed doing on his long-running radio show that trafficked in conspiracy theories, the paranormal, and "dark matter." Ham radio came up too, from time to time. In early 2004, Bell aired an extensive, live interview with then-ARRL President Jim Haynie, W5JBP (SK). "Coast to Coast AM" was syndicated nationwide in the early morning hours and, at its peak, was said to have reached 50 million listeners. A decidedly unconventional yet distinctive radio host, Bell produced the show from his own studio in the High Desert of Nevada. Often, after his show was over, he would get together on 75 meters with a group of friends. He used the phonetics "Old Broken Bottles" for his call sign.

Bell retired from "Coast to Coast AM" in the early 2000s, although served as a guest host as recently as 2010. The show's current host is George Noory. Bell briefly returned to the air with "Art Bell's Dark Matter," which lasted several weeks on the SiriusXM satellite network, but subsequently got involved with another radio program, "Midnight in the Desert," streamed via the Internet. He quit that show in 2015, however, citing "security concerns" at his home, reporting gunfire and repeated home intrusions; Bell said he believed someone wanted him to quit his shows.

Bell was born in Jacksonville, North Carolina, to US Marine Corps parents. He served in the US Air Force and was a medic during the Vietnam War, according to International Business Times, which also reported that Bell once operated a pirate radio station at Amarillo Air Force Base, playing anti-war music.

Bell was the author of the books, The Arts of Talk, The Quickening, and The Coming Global Superstorm.

His wife and a daughter survive. Bell also held the Philippines call sign 4F1AB.

More than 30,000 New Ham Licensees & 7,000 Amateur Radio Exam Sessions in 2017

For the fourth year in a row, more than 30,000 new licensees joined the Amateur Radio ranks, and the ARRL Volunteer Examiner Coordinator (VEC) conducted more than 7,000 Amateur Radio exam sessions, serving some 35,350 candidates for a new or upgraded license. At the end of December 2017, the US Amateur Radio population stood at 748,136. At nearly 378,000, Technician licensees represented the largest segment, with General (174,206), Amateur Extra (145,034), Advanced (41,938), and Novice (9,056) trailing. Licensee numbers showed continued growth across all classes except Advanced and Novice, which the FCC no longer issues; those numbers continue to drop.

"I'm hopeful that the number of new licensees will be more than 30,000 at the end of this year," ARRL VEC Manager Maria Somma, AB1FM, said. "I would love to see this trend continue!" Somma said topping the 7,000 mark in ARRL VEC-sponsored exam sessions since 2014 was "an important milestone for us." In 2017, the ARRL VEC administered 7,075 sessions.

Despite the optimistic influx of 32,196 newcomers last year, the net growth of 5,349 — about 0.72% over December 2016 — reflects some 27,000 expired or cancelled licenses in the FCC database over the past year. In making the case for changes to the entry-level license, the ARRL Board's Entry-Level License Committee referred to "the large number of Baby Boomers (roughly born 1945 – 65) [who] will soon be aging off the licensee rolls." The committee predicted the likelihood of "a significant decline in the number of hams, unless we take steps to reverse it."

Somma said that, in addition to exam session administration, ARRL VEC also processed and electronically transmitted 8,765 address changes and license renewals to the FCC for ARRL members in 2017. "This free service to members continues to be a strong draw," she said. She further pointed out that, as one of three FCC-authorized Club Station Call Sign Administrators (CSCSA), ARRL VEC processed and transmitted 1,761 club license applications for the FCC in 2017, of which 338 were for new club licenses.

What Is A T V?

(In Ham Radio it's NOT an All Terrain Vehicle!)

It Is Amateur TeleVision

Amateur television (ATV) is the transmission of broadcast quality (Fast Scan) video and audio over the wide range of frequencies of radio waves allocated for radio amateur(Ham) use. ATV is used for non-commercial experimentation, pleasure and public service events. Ham TV stations were on the air in many cities before commercial television stations came on the air. It is also called HAM TV or fast-scan TV (FSTV), as opposed to slow-scan television (SSTV).

The Amateur Television Network (ATN) is a series of amateur television repeater systems located at various locations in the United States. ATN was started in Southern California and now has several ATV repeaters linked to cover almost all areas from Santa Barbara to Cathedral City and from Las Vegas, Nevada to the southern areas of Riverside and Orange counties.
