Amateur Radio Responds to Disasters Across the United States

The fires are out on the Hawaiian island of Maui but extensive search and rescue operations continue.

President Biden visited the island on Monday, August 21, 2023, and told residents the federal



government will provide help "for as long as it takes" to recover from the devastation.

Numerous emergency response agencies and organizations are still arriving, and volunteers are helping to provide coordinated communications on the KH6COM repeater, on 146.520 MHz, and a VHF/UHF countywide system with emergency backup power. Hawaii has many amateur radio repeaters and an extensive internet-linked repeater system.

On the west coast of the United States, after a record amount of rainfall, Hurricane Hilary has

downgraded to a tropical storm and is heading toward the Northeast. The west coast area is still experiencing flooding and mudslides as residents face major cleanup operations.

Section Manager of the ARRL Los Angeles Section Diana Feinberg, Al6DF, said there weren't any amateur radio activations, but Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service and ARES groups were on heightened alert. There was minimal damage in the Los Angeles A Basin area. Feinberg also said the City of Los Angeles Auxiliary Communications Service was activated and reported to the Emergency Operations Center, but there weren't any communication outages.

Section Manager of the ARRL Santa Barbara Section John Kitchens, NS6X, said there was more concern for the 5.1-magnitude earthquake that hit his area during the storms. "There were no actual activations, but we were ready. Our folks [took] advantage of the situation and turned it into a real-time drill," said Kitchens.

The Hurricane Watch Net, WX4NHC amateur radio station at the National Hurricane Center, and the VolP Hurricane Net were activated on Sunday, August 20, for Hurricane Hilary. Despite having bilingual operators in each group, and the storm's impact to the Baja California peninsula, there weren't any reports from Mexico, much to the concern of net operators. WX4NHC Amateur Radio Assistant Coordinator Julio Ripoll, WD4R, said, "Hurricanes have no borders and ham radio has no borders."

Ripoll encouraged Mexican stations to check in and pass along reports when the net was active. "We can work together to help each other and those affected by hurricanes," he said.

Tropical storm alerts were issued along the south Texas coast on Tuesday, August 22, as Tropical Depression 9 formed in the Gulf of Mexico. The storm's center moved inland over south Texas by midday, when it became Tropical Storm Harold. It caused rain and wind, but there was little to no damage. The South Texas Amateur Radio Club said their amateur radio operators were ready even though they were not activated.

While tropical storms and an earthquake impacted large portions of the country, much of the Pacific Northwest has been dealing with wildfires.

In eastern Washington, the Spokane County ARES®/ACS was activated to deploy a mobile network unit (MNU) to the Gray Fire on Friday, August 18. The MNU is a self-contained, satellite-based internet and cell (AT&T, Verizon, and T-Mobile) support system. Volunteers set up the gear at an incident command post used by county officials.

Radio amateurs are encouraged to participate in their local <u>ARES group</u>.

Announcements

The special call sign AT2ISRO has been activated to commemorate India's Chandrayaan-3 spacecraft landing on the **moon.** Through August 25, 2023, four amateur radio operators in India -- Arunava Dey, VU3XRY: Nilkantha Chatterjee, VU2OII: Abhrajit Das, VU3YDA, and Amitava Gupta, VU3IBL -- will be maki contacts. Activity will be on most of the HF, VHF, and UHF bands, and EchoLink and FT8. The Chandrayaan-3 spacecraft was launched from Sriharikota in southern India on July 14, 2023. It touched down on August 23 at 8:34 AM ET. The landing makes India the fourth country, after Russia, the US, and China, to land on the moon and the first to land on one of the moon's poles. A special QSL card will be issued for all confirmed contacts.




New Operating Award Celebrates QRZ's 30th Anniversary

It's been eight years since QRZ began our operating awards program and in that time, we have issued over 373,000 awards. We want to thank all of you who use the QRZ Logbook on a daily basis, and there are A LOT of you. At this time, QRZ logbooks contain over 736 Million QSOs!

Our newest operating award is called the **30 Years**of QRZ Award and it is based solely on
communications between QRZ users. The award is
achieved when an operator has successfully
completed on-air contacts with 30 members of QRZ
from around the world. The award celebrates QRZ's
30th Anniversary by recognizing your
achievements.

We encourage you to take a look at the QRZ Awards Analyzer to see whether you qualify for the **30 Years of QRZ Award** at this time or to see how many more contacts you'll need to qualify.



QRZ Awards are FREE

As a member of QRZ with a valid amateur radio license, you are eligible to earn awards based on your QRZ Logbook contents. Your QRZ operating awards show up on your callsign page in a special tab called "Awards". There is no requirement to become a QRZ Subscriber to earn operating awards.

Fine lithographed QRZ award certificates are available at a modest cost.

If you would like a handsomely lithographed and numbered certificate with QRZ's signature holographic seal of authenticity, you may order them directly from your callsign page. These certificates were custom designed for our members and have been reproduced on fine paper by a commercial printing company. They have a gorgeous, high quality look and feel that uniquely recognizes the hard work and dedication used in earning your award.

Applying for an award is simple once you have the confirmed QSOs in your logbook!

From your logbook, simply click "Awards," select the logbook(s) to use toward the award by following the instructions on that page, and select the award heading that you're interested in. From there you will be shown the analysis of your logbook for that award in the Mixed mode. If eligible, you will be presented with a Congratulations screen, and given the option to apply.

To view a different mode, such as CW, Digital, or Phone, simply select the mode from the "Award Type" drop-down menu, and a new analysis will be completed. Like before, if you are eligible, you will be presented with a Congratulations screen, and given the option to apply.

Note: <u>Platinum Subscribers</u> receive one complimentary certificate per year. <u>Life</u> <u>Members</u> are entitled to unlimited certificates.

GETTING YOUR LICENSE RENEWED

One thing that every ham in the USA has in common is the FCC. Every ham in the US is registered with the FCC, just like hams in other countries are registered with their respective governments. This article will serve as a how-to for US hams to keep their licenses updated in accordance with regulations.

FREE FREE FREE

Okay, did that get your attention? It should because everyone needs to know that updates, and at this time, renewals, are free when you help yourself at the FCC website. Although using the FCC's website for updates is completely free, new licenses and renewals now cost \$35 and must be paid directly to the FCC.

Many of us have used the services of a VEC to update our license(s). Most VEC's charge a fee for license updates and renewals. It is a clerical fee paid to full-time employees who do nothing but fill out FCC forms for people. That's what you're paying for, a service. This means that you can do it yourself for free.

Step 1 - Understand the FCC's Website

While this sounds easy, many hams have gone right off the deep end from the very first page of the FCC's website. First of all, nothing on the page says "Amateur" or "Ham Radio" anywhere. Where do you go, where do you start?

First, understand that the FCC is HUGE. They are a gigantic bureaucracy that serves multi-billion-dollar

interests. They have dozens of databases, programs, and hundreds of licensing categories. Big corporations get licensed to manufacture their devices and cell phone towers. It's so large that from the front page, it seems incomprehensible. However, there is one thing that you must learn right now, even if you don't read the rest of the article. That one thing is:

Universal Licensing System or ULS

Then, when you go to the FCC's front page, at https://fcc.gov, ignore everything you see until you find a link that takes you to **ULS**. It shows up in a couple of places as a category, and it's the one you must use. Many hams, not knowing about ULS, registered with the FCC CORES system only to be greatly disappointed after none of their efforts resulted in an actual license update. What's worse is that while you're busy updating CORES, you aren't told of the ULS or its existence. Users are led to believe that they're making an update, such as to your FRN, using CORES when this accomplishes nothing for most hams. Stay away from CORES and everything else at the FCC. Only visit their **ULS** section.

Step 2 - Get a Login to the ULS system

To update your FCC Amateur radio license, you will need your FRN which is essentially your FCC user id. Logins to the FCC database are made using an FRN and a password. Right below where it asks for the password, it offers a **Reset Password** option. Use that to get a new password.

"What is my FRN"?

QRZ lists everybody's FRN in our call sign database. Just click on the Details tab to see it. On our pages, it is labeled as your **FCC Record Number** and there's even a button there to take you directly to the ULS record on the FCC website.

Step 3 - Start using ULS

Once you have your ULS login, things get a lot easier. With a login to ULS you can:

- Renew your license

- Update your mailing address
- Request a Vanity call sign
- Request a random new call sign
- Request a printed copy
- Get a PDF download of your certificate that doesn't say REFERENCE COPY across it.

Now, some FAQ's about the process.

What about a name change, such as marriage, etc. ?

You can't do that online. You must fill out additional forms and submit documents.

What about prior felony convictions?

You can't do that online. You must fill out additional forms and submit documents.

Do I need another FRN for my GMRS license?

No. That's the purpose of the FRN. The author has three FCC licenses, 1 amateur, 1 GMRS, and 1 Commercial Radiotelephone. All have the same FRN.

Why can't I log in to ULS with my call sign?

Because you may have other non-amateur-related business with the FCC and so the FRN is your universal identifier within the halls of the FCC.

I hope that many will find this a helpful guide. People have said for years that the FCC website is too complex, whereas the website is pretty simple. Their processes and procedures, nomenclature, and raw bureaucracy are the real problems. Getting people to realize that ULS is their true destination is half the battle won.
